

A Note from Our Vestry President

Vestry held its monthly meeting on November 13, 2023. Deaconess Deborah led with a devotional time sharing a blessing for beginnings and endings.

This provided Vestry with a moment of meditation to reflect upon the transitions that have occurred over the last several months and years but also focus on the transition forward. Vestry wholeheartedly thanks Pastor Drew for serving our Trinity Congregation as Interim Pastor during this transition. His call to Trinity

came as an answer to prayer. In contrast to our October Vestry meeting which held many actions points, this November meeting was about preparation and looking forward to projects underway and new endeavors approaching.

Vestry received updates from the Property Committee concerning the completion of phase one of the HVAC project along with discussion about phase two, which involves the auditorium.

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Currently, Vestry and the Property Committee are in the planning of phase two, which involves the air handling unit for the auditorium area. We are gathering information for the best way to implement the repairs and renovations that are needed for our building and a timeline for moving forward that will work in conjunction with the auditorium project.



This conversation will also include the Finance Committee to determine the most effective means of providing the needed funds for the work to be done.

Vestry and Finance Committee held a joint meeting on November 20 at which time the annual budget was finalized to be presented to the Congregation at the congregational meeting on December 10. The 2024 Stewardship campaign is currently underway. Vestry is also in the process of organizing a committee tasked with implementing the auditorium project and shower trailer capital campaign that was approved by the congregation last month. Vestry has appointed Brooke Rosenbaum and Allison McCanney as new members of the Personnel Committee. A resolution was passed waiving a reversionary right in property that is presently owned by the congregation of Renewed Spirit and is anticipated to be conveyed to Rock of Salvation Church for continued use as a place of worship to strengthen our City of Reading. Worship and Music reported to Vestry that some integral parts of worship that had been changed or eliminated during COVID will be reintroduced into our worship service with some elements arriving as soon as the Advent season.

Advent Adventures

During Advent we are waiting and preparing for the birth of our Lord and Savior. This year, in the days leading up to Advent, we are also waiting and preparing for the arrival of Pastor Hans. How exciting on both counts!

In Advent, we look forward to the presence of the Advent wreath and candle lighting. This year, members of ChAOS and their families will lead this portion of worship. We will use chanted setting 9 from the ELW and listen for the shruti box.

We will also return to several pre-Covid worship practices. While financial offerings will continue to be received before worship in the plate located in the narthex, we will return to presenting a flagon of wine, the paten with bread, and the offering. At the distribution time, everyone will receive the bread from Pastor Hans. You will then be guided to open spots at the chancel rail where you will receive the wine from pouring chalices. Complete directions will be announced and also be in the bulletin. We ask for your patience as we return to this procedure and refine the flow as necessary.

Music Musings

The Advent and Christmas seasons are filled with wonderful music. Preludes for Advent include a solo from Bach's Magnificat by choral scholar, Maria Yost; a duet from Magnificat by Hannah Long and choral scholar, Ben Hoover; Jacinda Motley singing a setting of "O Come, O Come" with Lisa Speece on flute; and two Advent hymns with several different ringing techniques by the Trinity Ringers. The shruti box will make a return appearance, accompanying both the choral Advent wreath lighting hymn and the psalm. The anthems will feature Hal Hopson's haunting setting of the text "Thou Shalt Know Him When He Comes"; the familiar John Ness Beck's "Every Valley"; the Mixed Ensemble, accompanied by piano and recorder singing Anne Krentz Organ's setting of "There's a Voice in the Wilderness"; and the Trinity Choir, with flute and clarinet, in her setting of "Canticle of the Turning."

Early Christmas Eve will feature the Trinity Orchestra, under the direction of David Himes, in his arrangement of "The Holly and the Ivy." Piano, flute, and handbells will accompany the Mixed Ensemble in Joel Raney's setting of "Royal David's City."

Music for the late service will include three selections by the Trinity Ringers, "Joy to the World," "In the Bleak Midwinter," and a setting of "We Three Kings" that you do not want to miss! Maria Yost will sing the familiar "Gesu Bambino" and Ben Hoover will begin the worship service with Scott Weidler's beautiful "This Holy Night." Choral pieces include "Ding Dong! Merrily on High," "There Is No Rose of Such Virtue" by Stephen Caracciolo featuring

Hannah Long, Michael Praetorius' "En natus est Emanuel," Donald Busarow's "The Best of Rooms," Michael Burkhardt's "Gaudete," and the stunning setting of "Where Shepherds Lately Knelt" by Kyle Haugen. Both services will include "Silent Night" led by Peter Graf on guitar as well as many other favorite carols. On December 31 we will continue our Christmas celebration and January 7 will feature a service of Epiphany Lessons and Carols. Come, hear our wonderful choirs as they lead us in worship during our preparation for and celebration of the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Don't forget the Let's Dance big band's "Swinging into Christmas" concert, here at Trinity on Friday, December 1 at 7:30 p.m. Trinity member Charlie Randazzo is the musical director of the band

December 10 and 17: Pitfalls and Promise of our Secular Age

Where is the church of Christ headed? As American Lutherans, we face a bleak picture: the ELCA's own demographers predict that, if current trends continue, our denomination of around three million will have only 66,000 members in 2050, about two-thirds of the 2021 membership of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod alone. Clearly we need to change our methods—or at least find the long-sought plateau.

And the ELCA is not alone in facing this reality. All denominations, save a few exceptions, are experiencing rapid, structural decline—whether progressive or conservative, liturgical or contemporary, hierarchical or independent. The primary driver? Secularization—a mass of social and cultural changes currently hitting the Western world. Instead of a culture that fosters religious belief and practice, we have a culture that disrupts it.

With these changes and disruptions come new opportunities for outreach and evangelism—something that Lutherans, used to growth by natural means for the first 300 years in North America, are not very practiced in. However, many studies indicate that young and diverse populations are interested in spirituality—including Christian spirituality—and are looking for experiences of community, connection, and transcendence. Furthermore, many people raised in

the church are looking for a way to be authentically Christian—connecting to the wells of Christian tradition or leaving behind a particular closed-minded moralism. Join Pastor Hans in Sunday Forum for a guided exploration of this through data, theology, and philosophy.


